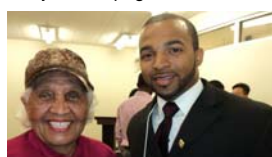

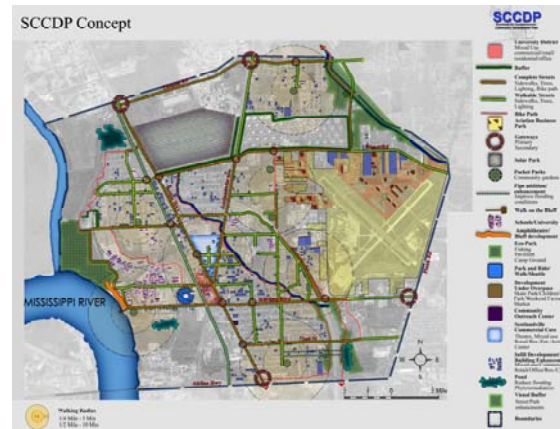

We would also like to thank the University of Texas at Austin (Community and Regional Planning Department), for again assisting in the development of the Scotlandville Comprehensive Community Development Plan (SCCDP). We at the U+R CDRC appreciate the time and input received in further developing the SCCDP. For those community members & other interested parties

that were unable to participate, the results will be posted on the website (www.urcdrc.org) by Monday, December 13, 2010 for additional input and suggestions. In this Dec. 2010/Jan. 2011 edition, on pages 2-3, is a summation of the information received during the Design Charrette, November 16-20, 2010.

The Scotlandville Comprehensive Community Development Plan (SCCDP) addresses a broad range of interrelated topics in a unified way. The SCCDP identifies & analyzes the relationships between education, economy, transportation, housing, the physical environment, land use and zoning, social services, and other community components. The SCCDP will set forth goals; analyzes existing conditions and trends; describes and illustrates a vision for physical, social, and economic conditions of the community, prospectively for the next twenty (20) years. This plan will outline policies and guidelines intended to implement the community's vision. The SCCDP is being developed through an engaged collaborative process involving citizens, students, businesses, stakeholders, local government officials, and local and state agencies.

WHERE DO WE GO FROM HERE?

To date, over 500 community members (students, residents and business owners) have participated in this process and their voices heard to ensure this is a community driven plan, representing the Scotlandville community. The SCCDP is scheduled to be completed in March of 2011. Over the next two months, the faculty, students and staff of the U+R CDRC will compile all the information gathered over the last 15 months to develop the SCCDP Booklet. This booklet will define the shared vision plan derived from comments expressed throughout this process with preliminary action steps, funding sources, responsible agencies, and approaches for monitoring the plan's success. We will continue to incorporate any feedback given during this time into the SCCDP. **On Tuesday, February 22 at 6 pm**, following the Community Against Drugs and Violence (CADAV) monthly meeting at the Scotlandville Library, we will present the SCCDP to the community for final feedback and comments. The feedback/comments will be incorporated into the final plan development before integration into the East Baton Rouge Master Plan (FUTUREBR). Continue to be involved as we finalize **Your Plan** for Scotlandville.

IMPLEMENTATION TECHNIQUES

As the development of the Scotlandville Comprehensive Community Development Plan (SCCDP) draws to a close, the emphasis on implementation becomes critical. In subsequent issues, the focus on different implementation techniques and their meaning for the SCCDP will continue to be explored. Every community is different, and the ways to revitalize communities are just as varied. Techniques such as Capital Improvement Programs, Empowerment Zones, Tax Increment Financing, and Business Improvement Districts, amongst others have been used in recent years to rejuvenate communities across the country. The key is to find the right combination of strategies to implement the portions of the plan that will invigorate community development.

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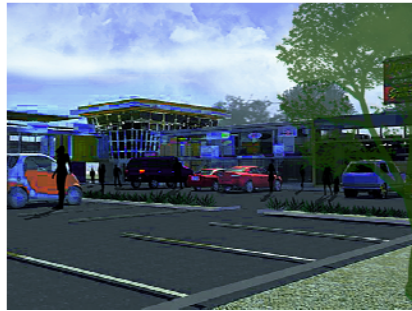

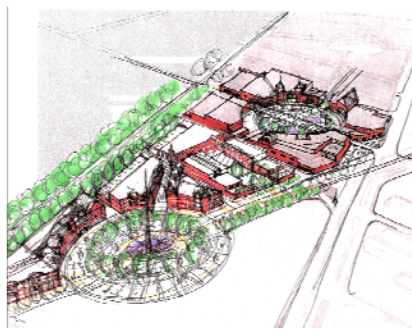

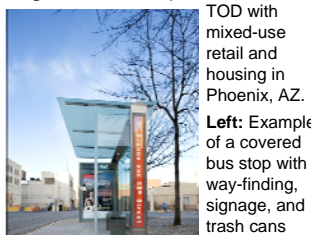

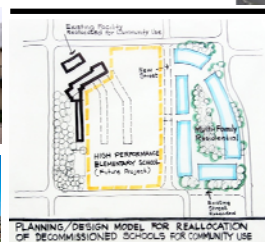
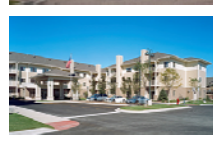

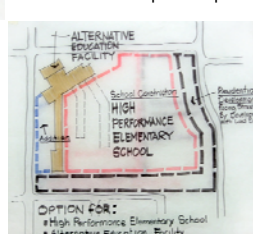

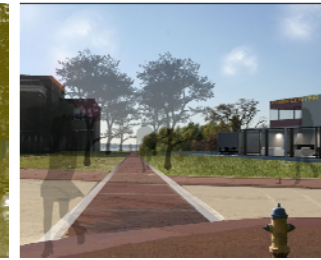

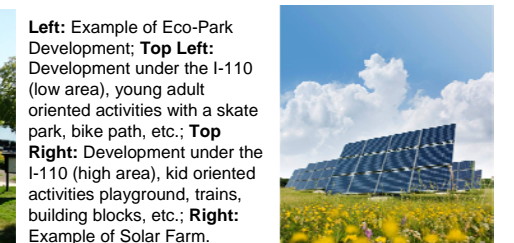
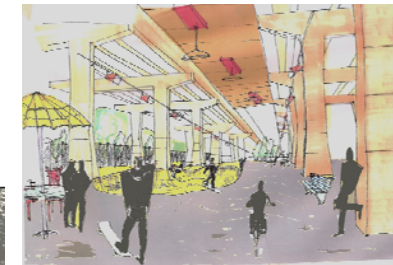

HOW TO MAKE IT HAPPEN

Over the five (5) day design workshop more than 20 state, city and local agencies were in attendance to offer assistance on possible funding options with suggestions on possible implementation strategies. An Action Plan Implementation Matrix will be included in the SCCDP Booklet. Below are just a few of the ideas that were presented at the Scotlandville Community Design Charrette, November 16 - 20, 2010:

SCCDP Implementation Strategies

- Develop public/private partnerships to implement several aspects of the plan (i.e. Transit-Oriented Development, Solar Park, etc.)
- Explore funding sources such as FEMA, HUD, NSF, EPA, etc.
- Utilize Redevelopment Authority's resources and programs to implement economic development within the community
- Develop community/school system partnerships to deal with possible existing elementary school closures, to propose alternatives to such actions
- Institute Adopt-A-Block programs to deal with deteriorating neighborhoods within the community
- Enhance existing community organizations, such as Community Against Drugs and Violence (CADAV) to have a greater impact in the target community
- Educate and train community members/local organizations on current programs/funds that may already be available to them
- Develop business incubator programs to build capacity amongst local businesses and grow new businesses
