March-April: Integration with the EBR Parish Master Plan ([FUTUREEBR](#)) and the Redevelopment Authority's Community Improvement Plan (CIP)

April - May: Strategies to accomplish the plan are finalized; Public hearing and adoption of the EBR Plan ([FUTUREEBR](#)) with inclusion of the Scotlandville Comprehensive Community Development Plan (SCCDP); The SCCDP placed on display at local libraries, City Parish Planning Commission and Southern University; the Synopsis of the SCCDP is distributed to all interested parties

June-Ongoing: Work with Scotlandville Community, Metro Council members and other interested groups to build consensus, to develop advocates that will embrace the plan and follow it through implementation to monitoring

PRESENTATION OF THE SCCDP

On Tuesday February 22, 2011 at the Scotlandville Library, the U+R CDRC presented the draft version of the Scotlandville Comprehensive Community Development Plan (SCCDP), at the monthly Community Against Drugs and Violence (CADAVID) meeting. Over 60 community residents, business owners and city/state agencies were in attendance, including State Senator Sharon Weston Broome, State Representative Dalton Honore, and State Representative Regina Barrow's Legislative Assistant Makesha L. Judson. The presentation was conducted by two U+R CDRC student members, Marlon Stepp and Whitley Calloway. The SCCDP sets forth goals, analyzes existing conditions and trends, describes and illustrates a vision for physical, social, and economic conditions of the community, prospectively for the next twenty (20) years. The draft plan was well received by those in attendance, and several comments and suggestions for improvement were voiced at the meeting. For those community members and interested parties that were unable to attend the meeting, the presentation is posted on the U+R CDRC website (www.urcdrc.org). You are more than welcome to provide feedback as we finalize the SCCDP. Over the next two months we will work with the East Baton Rouge Master Plan team [FUTUREEBR](#) and the Redevelopment Authority (RDA) to define funding strategies and implementation measures to realize this community driven plan. In May/June we will distribute the Synopsis of the SCCDP, and the full document will be available online, and for viewing at local libraries, the City Parish Planning Commission's office and at Southern University School of Architecture.



IMPROVEMENT PROGRAMS

As discussed in the last issue, we will take a look at several possible ways to implement aspects of the SCCDP. Across the country City and Neighborhood Improvement Programs are one of the most powerful tools. There are various types involving the purchase or construction, major repair, reconstruction, or replacement of items, such as buildings, utility systems, roadways, bridges, parks, etc. These programs are usually five to six year plans that are undertaken by the local governments and are typically large scale improvements within an area. These improvements are typically financed thru the sale of bonds by the government. On a much smaller scale, the East Baton Rouge Redevelopment Authority (RDA) is currently working on a different type of improvement program called a Community Improvement Plan (CIP). According to the RDA's website, these revitalization plans are community-driven and will provide action-oriented strategies to affect the physical environment in ways that improve the quality of life for citizens in the targeted communities. These five CIP areas were created through a collaboration with the Mayor's office and the five Metro Council Members that represent these unique areas within East Baton Rouge Parish. One of these areas includes the Scotlandville Gateway.
